HIGHLIGHTS

- The Same Page library card went live in April, 2022 providing residents of Nova Scotia with easy access to almost 1,000,000 items held at over 60 public library branches.
- Funding the staff position associated with the Moving Through Project will continue on a permanent basis. Successful events have included beading workshops, Virtual KAIROS Blanket Exercises for both staff and public, Three Sisters Companion packs in the Seed Library, Annual Gathering, featured collections, and authors.
- AVRL launched its **new website and events calendar** in March 2023. This update includes
 numerous accessibility upgrades and enhanced
 user experience, allowing for easier user
 discovery of services and events.
- The Wolfville New Branch Project has received a firm commitment by the Town to construct a new building (shared Library/Municipal office space) with a projected construction date of 2027.
